

2024 DOMINICAN REPUBLIC ELECTIONS READOUT

MAY 20, 2024

POPULAR INCUMBENT WINS SECOND TERM

- Economist and businessman Luis Rodolfo Abinader of the Modern Revolutionary Party has been reelected as the Dominican president, vowing to tackle the economy and strict policies towards migration from Haiti.
- With only 56% of voting center <u>reporting</u>, Abinader held approximately 60% of the vote, a 30% lead from runner-up and three-time former President Leonel Fernandez (People's Force), and provincial mayor, Abel Martínez (Dominican Liberation Party). Both presidential candidates <u>called</u> Abinader prior to the official results to concede and congratulate him given his strong lead.
- With notable economic accomplishments, increasingly tough policies on relations with Haiti, and <u>anticorruption</u> stances, Abinader maintains mass popular support. The President vowed to continue these efforts by building a border wall between the Dominican Republic and Haiti and "push through a constitutional reform on the continuity of power that would not rely on the 'personal whim' of the president in office," promising not to run again after completing his second term.

THE CONTINUATION OF A POPULAR AGENDA

Haiti Migration Crisis

- The Dominican Republic has seen a severe <u>increase</u> in Haitian migrants following the 2021 assassination of President Jovenel Moïse. President Abinader has promised to finish building a border wall along the 250-mile-long border between the two countries, which nearly 90% of <u>voters</u> expressed support for.
- While Abinader's migration policies are popular within the country, human rights groups are calling on the government to end the crackdown and <u>issue</u> a reprieve in deportation. Human rights activists called the policies a violation of international law as the government rejected pleas to build refugee camps and conducted mass deportation of 175,000 Haitians in 2023.
- The Haiti migration crisis has raised concerns about security and crime domestically, with increasing gang violence stemming from border issues.

Economic Prosperity Through Tourism

• Abinader took office in August 2020, and while many of the region's economies plummeted to an all-time low during the pandemic, the Dominican Republic grew its



- economy through a tourism campaign. In 2021 alone, the country <u>earned</u> approximately \$6 billion in tourism while maintaining a COVID death rate lower than major beach destinations and the United States.
- The positive economic outlook has continued through 2024, with the country now <u>predicted</u> to grow 5% in GDP this year. However, citizens are <u>arguing</u> that the benefits of this newly found prosperity are disproportionately distributed throughout the country as a large part of the population continues to struggle with inequality.

Cracking Down on Corruption

- Addressing the country's corruption was one of Abinader's key campaign promises in 2020 and 2024. During his first term, the President <u>arrested</u> 19 associates of former president Danila Medina, some of whom are accused of embezzlement, document forgery, and illicit campaign financing.
- Abinader's opposition has criticized his approach, <u>alleging</u> that no one in his government or party has been prosecuted for corruption, despite political allegations against them.
